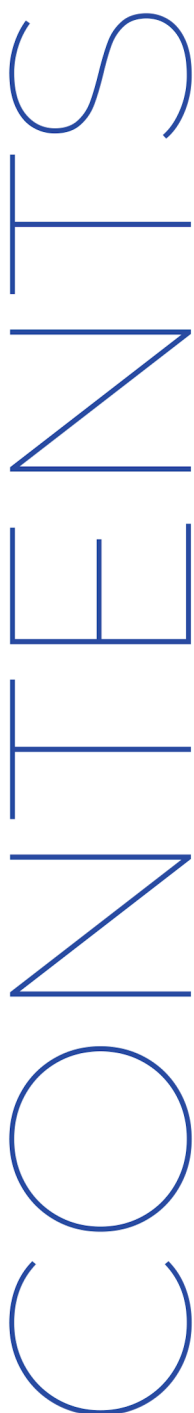

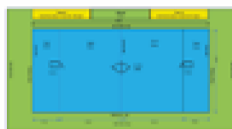

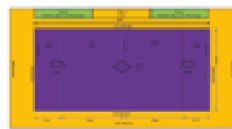

AeroSkatoBall is indigenous game started from 2016. This game basically combination of different ball game with skating. This game most popular in west and south India. This made AeroSkatoBall a dynamic discipline of high performance. AeroSkatoBall team is made up players of either the same and mix genders. In AeroSkatoBall, different physical qualities are developed, together with the psychological aspects and social values of the people involved in a game. What is more, due to its tactical and technical features, and the dynamics inherent in the game, it fosters a wide sense of cooperation among the players since there is no bouncing, dribbling of the ball and without skate not allowed.

Therefore, the only way to play is to pass the ball to teammates with the hands and wearing skating. This in turn forces players to constantly move around with skating in order to play or regain the possession, by employing the basic forms of movement such as not hold ball more than three second in hand, at time of skating with ball tossing compulsory, throwing in to the aero frame, receiving and scoring. Also, the development of these physical qualities stimulates aerobic and anaerobic endurance, strength, speed, power and specific coordination movements, which are all necessary to perform the essential technical and tactical basics of AeroSkatoBall.

The infrastructure and equipment needed for its practice are scarce (Skate, Aero Frame, a ball and a court) and they facilitate socialization and integration of a great number of people with little equipment; also, a quite small place for doing this fun activity is enough, so it is ideal for teaching at schools.

**AeroSkatoBall Meaning** - AeroSkatoBall play with skating and passing, tossing, throwing, shoot the ball in the Aero Frame. Whole and same time teammates catch the ball means goal and got three point, but ball fall down in the ground means opposite team got one point and same time another team player catch the ball means their team got three point. In the Skato zone area number of passing allowed, no any restriction but Basko zone area atleast one passing and one touching require before shoot the ball in Aero frame. These types of game have been performed since the ancient times by the forefathers of the Meitei/Meitei (Manipuri). 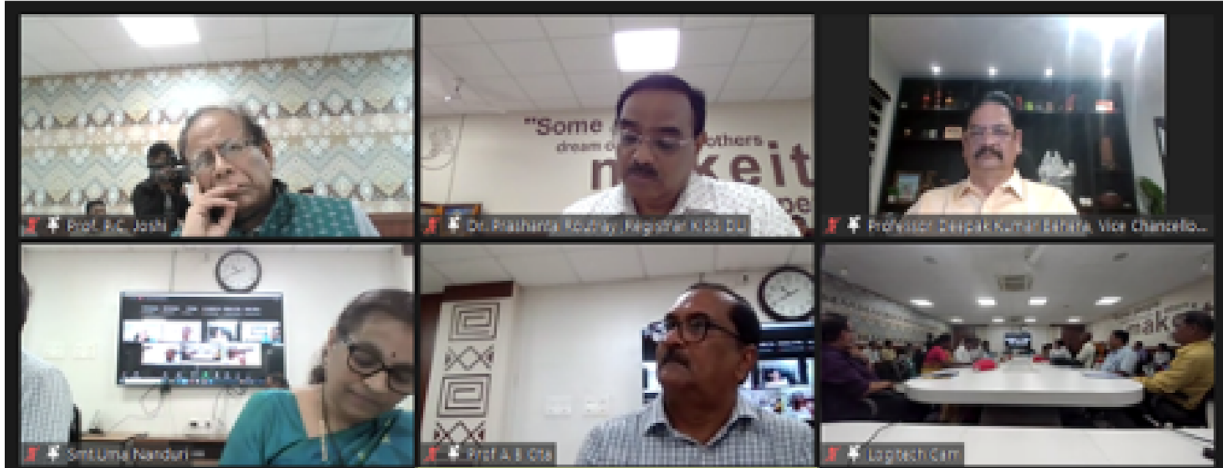

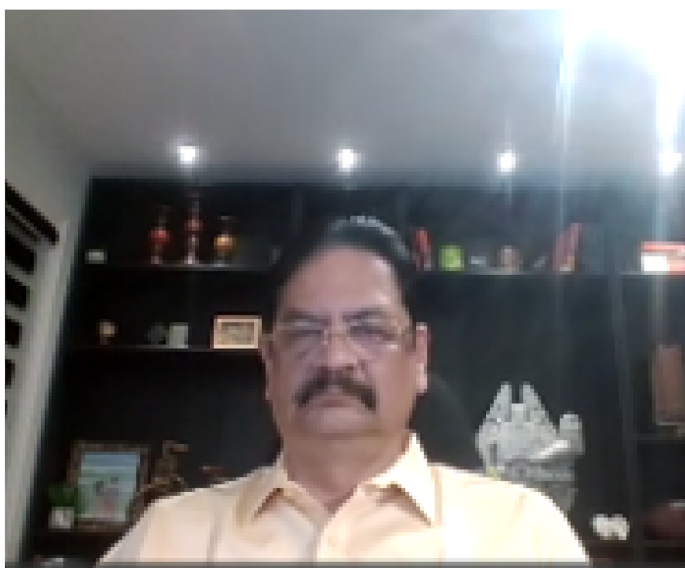
ON THE OCCASION OF THE 1ST JANJATIYA KHEL MAHOSAV 2023 AND CURTAIN RAISER WORLD ANTHROPOLOGY CONGRESS 2023



Kalinga Institute of Social Sciences-Deemed to be University (KISS-DU) hosted a two-day international seminar on **Sports and the Indigenous people in India and the World** at large between 10 and 11 June, 2023. The seminar was one of the three components of the Janjatiya Khel Mahotsav-2023, along with ten competition games and sixteen Demonstration games and exhibition on various tribal sporting traditions in India. Its **objective** was to initiate **an interdisciplinary conversation on the various aspects of the relationship between sports and tribal communities and cultures in India. It also explored how promotion and popularization of traditional sporting forms as intangible heritage can contribute to the accomplishment of SDG 2030.** Finally, the seminar **launched a public conversation on the various questions and concerns around the axes of the participation of tribal communities in sports. The participants came from the academia, the government, the civil society and the private sector.**



The inaugural session of the seminar was chaired by Smt. Uma Nanduri, Joint Secretary, Ministry of Culture, Government of India, while Smt. Sanjukta Mudgal, Joint Secretary in the Ministry of Culture and Director, The Anthropological Survey of India chaired the valedictory session. Other distinguished scholars and administrators who attended it included P.C.Joshi, Former Vice Chancellor, Delhi University, A B. Ota, Emeritus Professor, KISS-DU Retired IAS officer and Director, SCSTRTI, Odisha, renowned anthropologist Prof. Shalina Mehta of the Punjab University, Chandigarh, Sarit Kumar Chaudhury, Dean, Rajiv Gandhi University, Itanagar, Prof Deepak Kumar Behera, Vice Chancellor, KISS Deemed to be University, K C Mahali, Chairperson of the Tribal Advisory Committee Director General and Director General, KISS-DU and Dr. Prashanta Kumar Routray, Registrar, KISS DU. The nine scholars who made detailed presentations made up the nucleus of the seminar.



Prof. Deepak Kumar Behera, Vice Chancellor, KISS DU while welcoming the guests and delegates, emphasised the unique character of the seminar as an integral part of the first ever national level tribal sports festival in the country. **Behera said that the conference resonated with the spirit of the National Education Policy, 2020**, hoping for the presentations to contribute towards the **documentation of various dwindling tribal sporting traditions, and looking forward to greater interdisciplinary conversations and cross fertilisation of ideas.**

**He also spoke about the forthcoming World Anthropology Congress, which will be held in KISS on 9-14 August, and to which the seminar was billed as a Curtain Raiser.** Prof. Behera expressed his satisfaction that the first ever Janjatiya Khel Mahostav was hosted at KISS-DU, which is dedicated exclusively to educating Tribal students in India, and to the protection, preservation and promotion of tribal heritage, culture and knowledge traditions. He lauded the **vision and supervision of the Founder Prof. Achyuta Samanta** towards the promotion of sports and sports research in Odisha and India while briefing the guests about the outstanding performance of tribal students of KISS DU in games and sports both at the national and international level and about the excellent sports infrastructure at KIIT and KISS. Prof. Behera, himself an anthropologist of international repute, believed that the everyday activities of tribal communities in India, involving hunting, climbing mountains, ploughing fields or climbing trees, plausibly feed into their passion for sports.

Dr. Anirban Bandyopadhyay, Associate Professor and Director of the Centre for Tribal Cultural Heritage and Diversity at KISS-DU, which conceptualized and coordinated the event, offered an overview of the themes to be covered. He also introduced the audience to the participants, highlighting their diverse profiles and the action-oriented approach of their work, combining research and practice.



Prof. A. B. Ota in his inaugural overview situated the seminar within the flagship Azadi Ka Amrit Mahotsav programme of the Government of India which seeks to inculcate pride among Indian citizens by celebrating various traditions of the Indian people. Referring to the identification by UNESCO of traditional sports as an intangible cultural heritage, he **called for greater documentation of various tribal sporting traditions in India. Given that a majority of successful Indian sportspersons often come from tribal backgrounds, he recommended that promising tribal sportspersons need to be**

**identified at a young age, and clusters need to be formed, where they should be groomed as sports professionals. Institutions such as KISS, which virtually functions as a prototype of such grooming centres for promising tribal sportspersons, must be recognised and strengthened.** He called for the seminar to provoke a larger conversation on documentation of tribal sporting traditions and exploring strategies for the mainstreaming of tribal sports and games. Ota also **requested the Ministry of Culture to turn such events event into an annual affair, underlining the potential of such festivals to delivering sustainable empowerment of various tribal communities in India by packaging development through sports. He also requested the Ministry of Culture to establish a Center of Excellence for research and promotion of Tribal traditions at KISS DU, sanctioning four or five special fellowships for KISS-DU for research, documentation and a repository on tribal sports and games.** He too, like Prof. Behera, concluded with a **request to the Ministry of Culture to help and support the forthcoming World Anthropology Congress at KISS-DU.**

**Smt. Uma Nanduri, Joint Secretary, Ministry of Culture, Government of India, delivered the inaugural address. Locating JKM 2023 as a part of Azadi Ka Amrit Mahostav, she briefed the audience about the mandate of the AKAM series of events to inculcate pride among the citizens in India's culture and heritage. The AKAM brand since its launch in March 2021 has grown into a popular campaign for sustainable development involving the whole of India,**

focusing on nine themes such as water conservation, women and child development, tribal empowerment, unity, inclusive development, Atma Nirbhar Bharat and cultural pride. These themes are derived from the Prime Minister's concept of Panch Pran, which focuses on eradication of a colonial mindset and celebration of Indian culture and heritage. Explaining the central role of the Ministry of Culture in the JKM, she said that the sporting excellence of the tribal athletes is intimately related to their everyday lifestyle and values in that they live in harmony with nature and their diet too is often sourced directly from nature.



Welcoming the request to the Ministry about the establishment at KISS of a centre of excellence in research on Tribal heritage in India, she observed that the Ministry would like to explore such possibilities. Expressing happiness that JKM 2023 successfully forged connections among cultural traditions from various parts of the country, she invited the audience to explore the extensive documentation being carried out under the AKAM project, highlighting how building cultural linkages between apparently disparate sites such as Tamil Nadu and Benaras characterises the mandate of the AKAM. She called for the audience in Odisha to take advantage of the scheme and carry out greater documentation of the beautiful culture, natural heritage, textile and temples in Odisha. She concluded with an advice for greater documentation for the various tribal games coming up for demonstration, and a book out of the proceedings of the conference with practical recommendations on how best to mainstream tribal sporting traditions.



Delivering the Vote of Thanks for the inaugural session, **Dr. Prashanta Kumar Routray, Registrar of KISS-DU**, pitched the seminar as an action-oriented initiative to promote tribal sports, hoping for its recommendations to be incorporated in the academic practices in KISS and elsewhere in future. He also extended his **gratitude to the Ministry of Culture and Smt. Nanduri for her constant support, along with Dr. Achyuta Samanta, the Founder of KISS and KIIT, Prof. Deepak Kumar Behera, the Vice Chancellor of KISS DU and the other dignitaries and participants.**

## EVENT: THE FIRST BUSINESS SESSION



The first business session, which began soon after, featured paper presentation by four scholars from India and abroad with extensive research experience in the domain of tribal sports. **Dr. Prakash Rao, M.A.S., from College of Physical Education, Visakhapatnam spoke on “Socio- Economic status assessment of tribal sports in Uttarandhra”.** He spoke about what holds back several promising tribal athletes from the region who had failed to rise to national or international eminence, focusing on 32 tribal communities in Uttarandhra.

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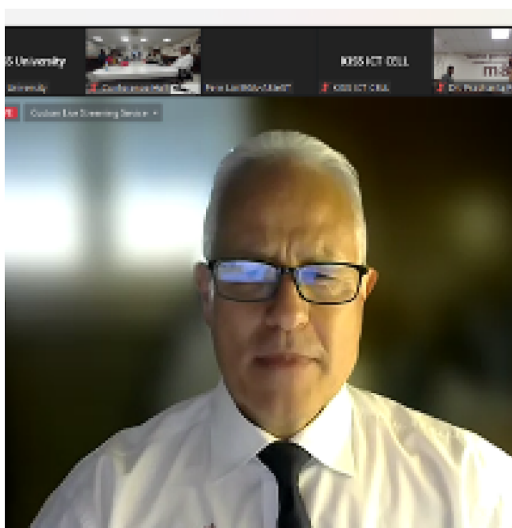


Dr. Pradip Tudu, who teaches at B.N.D.S. Mahavidyalaya, which comes under administrative supervision of the University of Burdwan, spoke on Santal Tribal Games of India: Introducing Structure and Rules. He observed that that several popular games in the Santhal community were associated with marriage and other life cycle rituals. Tudu took up four games--Gada Gadi, Sim Tupuf, Thili Dipil, Gada Yudhya- presenting a detailed framework for their rules, regulations, player composition. Presenting vignettes of these four games through audio-visual documentation, he added that he has already identified 150 such community games, which offer immense potential for documentation.



Dr. Suresh Chand Soren, who works at Panskura Banamali College in West Bengal, presented his research on the contribution of Santhal Football players over a decade in West Bengal. Soren, who had been professional football player himself, highlighted the diet and nutritional challenges faced by budding tribal footballers as a major impediment to their progress. As these footballers gradually rise through the ranks to national eminence, alienation from the parent society, lack of language skills and formal education often come in the way

of effective communication with trainers, experts or other well-wishers, eventually leading to a decline in their performance and prospects. Soren called for dedicated training and grooming institutions, combining sports, nutritional and academic training to promising tribal sportspersons, to be immediately set up in remote tribal areas.



Dr. Pere Lavega-Burgues, President of the European Traditional Sports, and Games Association, and INEFC Lleida, Spain, spoke after lunch. He emphasized the prospects and opportunities which promotion of traditional games and sports hold for a positive transformation of society. Sharing his experience measurable improvement in inter community relations through the promotion and practice of traditional games in Catalonia, he argued that **the practice of traditional games serve as effective carriers of positive values to the entire society.** Traditional games often help the common people imbibe the traditional wisdom of a community in an entertaining manner. Lavega Burgues claimed that

**traditional sports have the potential for promoting empowering values such as equality through education at the national and international levels. Since traditional games form an intimate aspect of local cultures, they are deeply rooted within local communities and local intangible heritage. He briefed the audience about a series of MOOC courses his team has designed to promote values like equality, gender parity, social inclusion, heritage protection and sustainability through practice of traditional games. He believed that networking among various stakeholders through sharing knowledge about traditional games and traditional sports was the need of the hour.** Offering snippets from the various MOOC courses with themes such as gender equality and social inclusion, Lavega Burgues called for international collaborations, particularly among professional academics and civil society organizations.



Shalina Mehta, distinguished anthropologist and former Professor of Panjab University, Chandigarh, presented a summary of the major findings of the days speakers. The animated participation of Santhali students and professors of KISS-DU, who spoke in their own language with the delegates, was the high point of the Question and Answer session which followed. There was a rigorous debate on whether rules of Santhal games vary from state to state. Prof. Mehta adjudicated that the traditional games should be documented

with their local particularities as far as possible, even as we attempt to work out standardised rules. There were several questions for Dr. Lavega which he addressed with patience and humour. Addressing the question on whether the UN has defined the concept of the indigenous clearly enough, Dr Lavega responded that traditional games played by children with the rules being made by the local community at the local level and performed in festivals and local conditions in an informal manner somehow connected with the local culture and tradition, without any standardised set of rules or a central regulatory body may be admitted as traditional games. Addressing a question about how social inclusion and gender equity are incorporated in the MOOC courses, Dr. Lavega said such issues should be approached with open mindedness, even as local variations must be incorporated through consultations with local stakeholders. He observed that an international consortium of teachers and practitioners through empirical research and practice have already identified 1000 games, along with the core values associated with them. Such games have already been used to resolve about 1000 conflict situations in various cultures.

Seconding Lavega, Sanghamitra Ray, Deputy Director, Projects at KISS, recalled an earlier project KISS had carried out in collaboration with the British Council about teaching values among students through a sports-based training curriculum. Ray observed that the programme had led to distinct rise in gender sensitivity among participating students. Ray also asked whether there may be a way to implement the MOOC modules at a community level which is more informal, and lacks institutional academic arrangements. Dr. Lavega was open to the possibility, suggesting teachers and students and the youths can gradually explore ways in which these courses may be directly offered at the level of local communities.



The participants were later moved to the networking session. The Networking Session among participants, officials, trainers, athletes from demonstration and competition games and the audience were organized in different sports venues. They were seen to interact with one another, making for a direct knowledge and experience transfer from the domains of theory to application and vice versa.

## EVENT: DAY TWO



Proceedings on the second day started with the presentation of Dr. Onima Reddy, who is a Professor at the Department of Physical Education at the Banaras Hindu University. Reddy spoke offered a **Cross-Sectional Analysis of Socio-Psychological Differential among Sports Achievers, Non-Sports Achievers, and Non-Sports Participants among Tribal Women of Jharkhand.** The inspiration behind her study was her own experiences of hunting expeditions of the tribal people and various ceremonies observed during community celebrations

in Jharkhand, where she grew up. Reddy explained the socio-psychological variables taken for the study, its limitations as well as the major findings. Hard physical labour, which the tribal women regularly carry out to earn their livelihood, moulds their physical structure in a manner conducive to sporting excellence. **Their highly physical and functional lifestyles equip them with more efficient physical and motor fitness components which excellence in sports warrants.** Reddy found that women tribal athletes in Jharkhand state have excelled in sports on account of better physical fitness and several socio-psychological characteristics. She showed that women tribal athletes display high self esteem and better social and emotional adjustments. **She also argued that participation in sports as such tended to improve the idea of self-esteem among tribal and non-tribal athletes. In terms of application, the study appeared to be particularly useful for sociologists, anthropologists, psychologists and educators or trainers who work with tribal professionals with regard to selection trials or other kinds of evaluation or assessment of potential candidates for physical education training or sports programmes. More specifically, her study would be useful for coaches, athletes, and sports psychologists to identify those socio-psychological factors which contribute to sporting success and shall in turn help them to fine tune their training programmes, apart from offering useful clues towards the direction of future research in sports psychology and sports sciences.**



Dr. Manohar Kumar Pahan, an Assistant Professor in the Department of Sports at the Ramakrishna Mission Vivekananda Educational and Research Institute, Belur Math, West Bengal, too addressed similar themes. Psychological resilience is a major factor that influences sporting performance during both training and competition. Reactive stress tolerance, or the ability to withstand stress for a long time at work, contributes to a better understanding of the prospects of excellence or success among sportspersons.

Pahan argued that reactive stress tolerance can be taught and cultivated, aiding promising athletes to reach their desired performance goal. Pahan studied the reactive stress tolerance of athletes from tribal and non-tribal communities and the effect of training experience on stress tolerance capacity by controlling possible background-affecting factors. **Examining the possible causes of existing differences between these two communities as well as what happens if they are exposed to similar living and training conditions for a few years, he found that tribal athletes are less likely to choke under pressure. He believed that these positive values are inculcated within them during their childhood and early youth through socialization.**



Neeraj Kumar Mehra, Chief Executive Officer, Dr. B.R. Ambedkar Sports Foundation, offered an overview of the approach of the International Olympics Committee towards culture since its inception. The IOC advocates a blending of sports in education and culture. Narrating the difference between sports, games and play and how a game is chosen by the IOC as a recognized sport, Mehra **framed sporting traditions within the rubric of intangible cultural heritage.**

**He recommended that Janjatiya Khel Mahostav should be used as a platform for sustainable development through incorporation of sports as a tool for tribal development in the mainstream policy framework. Elaborating on the alignment of sports with the SDG goals, he recommended that Janjatiya Khel Mahostav should be regularly staged at international, national, state, regional and zonal levels through collaboration between the Ministry of Culture, the Ministry of Tribal Affairs and the Ministry of Sports. He proposed for a special quota for participants in events like JKM, similar to quotas assigned to talented singers or actors under various schemes available with the ministry of culture. Such reservation may help them in terms of preferential access to education and jobs.**

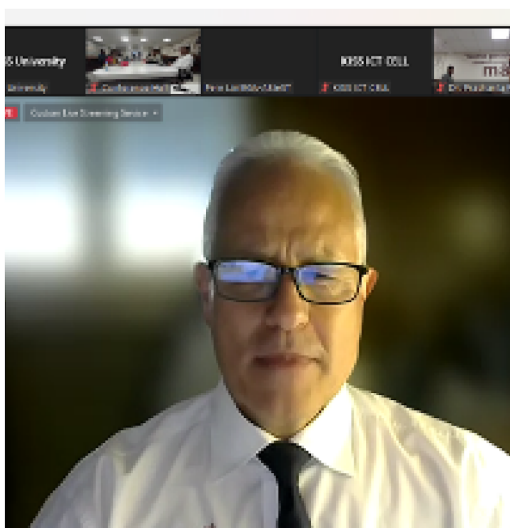


**Dr. Gopal Chandra Saha, Professor, Department of Physical Education and Sport Science, Visva-Bharati, Santiniketan, spoke about the 'Effect of Scientific Soccer Training on Playing Ability and Psychological Variables of Tribal and Non-Tribal Soccer Players of West Bengal'. He touched upon various positive dimensions of self-perception among the players which emerged through their participation in sports. Dr. Saha said that the tribal players must be identified and groomed at a young age, and provided with high quality coaching to excel in their career.**



Professor Guy Gouen, President, The International Traditional Sports, and Games Association, Morlaix, France spoke about the contribution of the association for more than 30 years in promoting traditional sports activities as intangible heritage. **Arguing that traditional games constitute intangible heritage, he called for protection of these games should against unrestricted commercialisation. Gouen called for academicians, researchers and policy makers in India to assume a leading role in researching indigenous sports. He also advocated**

Senior anthropologist Prof. Sarit Kumar Chaudhury from Rajiv Gandhi University, Arunachal Pradesh, who is also a former Director of Indira Gandhi Rashtriya Manav Sangrahalaya, Bhopal delivered the final formal lecture, sharing his personal experiences of various tribal games in North East India. The understanding about play or leisure and culture among the tribes or the indigenous people across the world is as old as the history of anthropology, he observed. They are connected with their everyday practices of life or their collective understanding or involvement in the course of various engagements around their livelihood or other cultural contexts. Leisure activities are perceived as non-utilitarian

pursuits grounded against a wider context of martial and political perspectives.

Anthropologists often study games in a cultural context as a part of the social systems, and try to understand why such games in the indigenous communities involve teamwork rather than individual attributes. Many believe that games and sports, like religious rituals and festivals, can be interpreted as reflections of social relationships and cultural ideas. Such understanding remains valid for the majority of the Indian tribes in general and North East Indians in particular. **Each and every type of the eight states in the north east region has their traditional games or sports. Unfortunately, many of such valuable cultural performances are gradually fading first from the collective societal domain for multiple factors. Not unlike indigenous languages, many of such games may have already become endangered though they may yet be traced from the collective or individual memories of respective communities.**



Chaudhury also referred to annual international celebrations involving such indigenous games. For example, in 2015, the world indigenous games were held in Brazil, which successfully brought together over 2000 indigenous athletes from 50 different ethnic groups to compete in varieties of traditional games. The 2015 games also featured opportunities to celebrate and discuss human rights and environmental issues through the lectures, prayers and forums. In 2017, during the world indigenous games in Canada, there were many opportunities to celebrate indigenous culture and traditions with audiences and participants from different parts of the world. Rajiv Gandhi University, Arunachal, where Chaudhury works, regularly holds Arunachal panorama, a celebration of the identity markers of the tribes of the Arunachal Pradesh led by the students community of the university. Performance of traditional games is one of components of the celebration. Chaudhury also referred to a 1991 booklet published on the Games of NEFA as a valuable repository on the traditional games popular in Arunachal Pradesh.



Chaudhury observed that some games may at the same time belong to the indigenous people of one region and be played by other indigenous groups elsewhere in the country. The point resonated with the debate following Pradip Tudu's presentation on the first day. Finally, Chaudhury recalled an exhibition on traditional games of the Kom people of Manipur which was received with great appreciation and attracted plenty of visitors from different parts of the north east in some ways anticipating the JKM. **He too called for events like JKM to be made into an annual event as a means to attract popular appreciation and engagement of traditional games as a means to understanding tribal culture and promoting sustainable development**, inviting the state to think about the formulation of the policies which will encourage younger generations to practice and participate in such unique tribal traditions He concluded with the observation that the New Education Policy 2020 provides for sufficient flexibility to accommodate such innovative courses in the curriculum.

Responding to Chaudhury's address, **A.B. Ota repeated the need for greater documentation of various rare tribal sporting forms, and a request for a centre for excellence in tribal sports tradition research to be set up at KISS**, focusing on documentation and a few special fellowships (4 to 5) every year.



Prof. Shalina Mehta, in her comment lauded the potential of events like the World Indigenous Games to bring about international people to people understanding and cultural exchange. Prof. Mehta also requested the Ministry of Culture to see if some of these traditional games of vibrant cultural exhibition showcasing the cultural diversity of India during the forthcoming World Anthropology Congress. P.C. Joshi too emphasized that sports, specially the Janjatiya Khel, or tribal traditional sports, must belong to the realm of intangible cultural heritage of the country.

Joshi drew the attention of the audience to the common popular belief that gods often play games to their devotees as humans as a possible site where anthropological research and public performance of sports and popular religiosity in India converge in peculiar ways, holding up Ramleela as a site of such convergences of research, application and performance of popular religion. Sports and games thus often appear to be part of a long tradition of the performance of popular religiosity in India. He too, like Behera, Ota and Chaudhury, called for JKM to be turned into an annual cultural festival of tribals, bringing together an annual confluence of research, performance and exhibition of sports as intangible cultural heritage among the tribal communities in India as a celebration of the cultural diversities of this great civilisation.**



Smt. Sanjukta Mudgal, Joint Secretary, Ministry of Culture and Head, Anthropological Survey of India, delivered the valedictory address. Locating the Janjatiya Khel Mahostav 2023 within the overall mandate of the Azadi ka Amrit Mahostav as a unique initiative to inculcate pride among the tribal communities of India holding up their sporting traditions as a wellspring of intangible cultural heritage. Highlighting the three components of Janjatiya Khel Mahostav 2023--competition games, demonstration games, and a research

seminar--she recalled her own lifelong personal proximity as a Forest Service Officer with tribal communities of Madhya Pradesh, which has 30% of the population belonging to tribes and 4 primitive vulnerable tribal group including the Baiga, Saria, and Bharia. She recalled her personal association with the Bharia community which belongs to a remote pocket called Tamia in Chhindwara district. She agreed that it is high time that traditional tribal sporting



traditions are documented all over India as an intangible heritage, noting with approval the increasing interest of researchers to work on various aspects of tribal communities' sports culture in India. She invited KISS to design an appropriate project proposal for such documentation to be sent up for approval to the National Culture Fund, adding that the Ministry of Culture is open to funding promising projects. Smt. Mudgal also promised a visit of a team from Anthropological Survey of India (ASI) to inspect the wonderful work being carried out at KISS, concluding that the ministry would take note of

the suggestions and recommendations from the seminar, initiate steps with various stakeholders to address those suggestions.

Prof. Jugal Kishore Mishra, Director, IQAC, KISS-DU, delivered the formal vote of thanks, with which the two-day international seminar on sports and indigenous communities in India and the world came to an end.
